

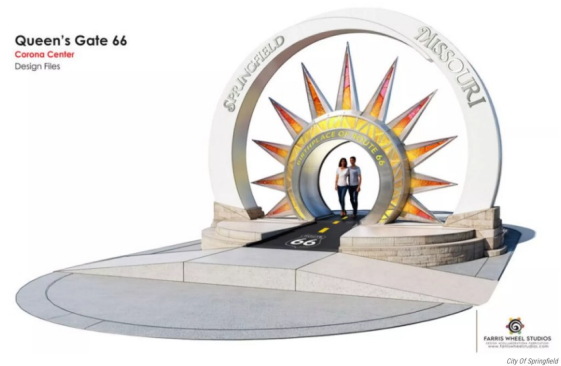


The Dangers of Queen of Heaven | KIB 529

Note Regarding Eleven-Pointed Crown in Springfield

There is no biblical, academic, or archeological connection between eleven and the Queen of Heaven. However, the number 11 has biblical significance.

- Often represents **disorder, incompleteness, or transition**
- Example:
 - Joseph had **11 brothers** before the full 12-tribe structure
 - It can imply something **not yet aligned with divine order**

👉 If anything, 11 would symbolize **imbalance**, not divine authority.

I. The “Queen of Heaven” in Scripture

The explicit biblical phrase appears in the Book of Jeremiah.

Key Texts (ESV)

1. Jeremiah 7:18

“The children gather wood, the fathers kindle fire, and the women knead dough, to make cakes for the queen of heaven...”

2. Jeremiah 44:17–19

“We will do everything that we have vowed, make offerings to the queen of heaven and pour out drink offerings to her...”

3. Jeremiah 44:25

“Go ahead, confirm your vows, and perform your vows, you women who burn offerings to the queen of heaven...”

Observations from the Text

1. Family-wide participation

- Men, women, and children were all involved.
- This was not fringe—it was **normalized cultural worship**.

2. Ritualistic devotion

- Cakes, incense, and drink offerings indicate **liturgical structure**.
- Suggests an **organized religious system**, not casual idolatry.

3. Defiant theology

- The people claimed prosperity came from her (Jer. 44:17–18).
- This reflects a **false attribution of blessing**, a key Babylonian trait.

4. Feminine divine archetype

- The deity is explicitly female.
- Associated with **fertility, provision, and protection**.

II. Historical Identity: Who Was the “Queen of Heaven”?

Scholars broadly connect the biblical “Queen of Heaven” with Mesopotamian and Near Eastern goddesses.

1. Inanna / Ishtar (Primary Candidate)

- Sumerian: **Inanna**
- Akkadian/Babylonian: **Ishtar**

Attributes

- Goddess of: Love and sexuality
- War
- Fertility
- Symbol: **Eight-pointed star (Venus)**
- Title: Often called **“Queen of Heaven”**

Key Insight

This is the **strongest historical match** to Jeremiah’s reference, especially given Judah’s exposure to Babylonian culture.

2. Astarte (Canaanite/Levantine)

- Hebrew: **Ashtoreth**
- Worshiped by:
 - Canaanites
 - Phoenicians
 - Israelites during apostasy

Biblical Connections

- Frequently condemned in the Old Testament
- Associated with:
 - Baal worship
 - Sexual rites
 - Fertility cults

3. Isis (Egypt)

- Title: Often called **“Queen of Heaven”** in later periods
- Attributes:
 - Mother goddess
 - Protector
 - Magic and resurrection

Relevance

While not directly referenced in Jeremiah, Isis represents the **same archetypal system** in Egypt.

4. Later Parallels: Greco-Roman World

- **Aphrodite** (Greek)
- **Venus** (Roman)

These continue the same pattern:

- Sexuality
- Fertility
- Cosmic feminine power

III. Theological Analysis: A Unified System

Across cultures, these goddesses share a consistent profile:

Trait	Description
Fertility	Control over life, reproduction, crops
Sexuality	Sacred prostitution, erotic ritual
Heavenly Identity	Linked to stars (especially Venus)
Motherhood	Nurturer and sustainer
Power	Often paired with a male deity (Baal, Tammuz, etc.)

IV. Spiritual Pattern: The Babylonian System

Broader research on Mystery Babylon connects with the Queen of Heaven.

Core Idea:

The “Queen of Heaven” is not just a deity—it is a **spiritual system of counterfeit divine femininity.**

Characteristics

1. Counterfeit Provision

- People credited her for prosperity (Jer. 44:17)
- Competes with God as provider

2. Sensual Worship

- Worship tied to **carnality and desire**
- Aligns with later Mystery Babylon (Rev. 17)

3. Religious Syncretism

- Israel blended her worship with Yahweh worship
- This is the essence of **spiritual adultery**

“Babylon the great, mother of prostitutes...” (Rev. 17:5, ESV)

The Queen of Heaven represents:
